THE UNIQUENESS OF UU RELIGION

Can we do it? Will it work? Unitarian Universalism has a religious way that is unique. It is unique in that most if not all other religions aim to put their members into a doctrinal structure—a structure that is enforced in various ways, including in some in some cases disfellowshipping any who persistently refuse to conform. Do this, believe that, or you're out!

That can't happen in the UU religion, because it's a *non-creedal* religion. We UU's don't have any doctrines or dogmas to enforce. Which opens up marvelous possibilities: people with a wide range of beliefs and ideas, sharing space and fellowship in church; no restraints on what speakers can preach or teach from our pulpit; freewheeling discussions among members with sharply differing points of view.

It's a beautiful idea that's really tough to practice. The practice of UU religion calls for a big, wide-open doorway of tolerance. The differences in our discussions are often about dichotomies such as Christian-versus-atheist, humanist-versus-believer, agnostic-versus-deist, conservative-versus-liberal, spiritual-versus-secular, science-versus-mysticism. Whatever one's personal position, the challenge is for each of us to listen attentively and speak civilly. Those are often not easy things to do. But the rewards are tremendous! In fact, if we develop effective techniques for getting along with one another, we can offer valuable insights and methods to the larger society in which we live.

In a sense, we are like the United States of America, which—in a great experiment—is a home for people of many cultures—a place where it is intended that people of diverse religions and cultures and philosophies and politics can live as neighbors in mutual respect. In UU we too have a great experiment going. We have chosen to avoid doctrinaire, dogmatic religion and have covenanted to "affirm and promote . . . acceptance of one another" within the diversity of our congregations. So, like the United States, UU's have opened their arms to all kinds of people. It is indeed a very different kind of religion—different and better.

Can we get along with one another? Can we refine the art of civil discourse? Can we be friends and fellow-members, even though we may sharply disagree with one another? Can we offer the world something better than war and discord? Can love triumph over wrangling and alienation? Can we have unity within our diversity? I believe the answer to all of those questions is a resounding YES! It won't be easy, but I think it's very much worth doing. Do you?


Last Wishes Project
