Foster kids often arrive at their new foster home with all of their property in a plastic trash bag or paper bags. This is the only way they are able to transport their meager belongings.


This year we plan to fill duffel bags with items that will provide some comfort as well give the children somewhere to store some of their things. We are asking your help to make this a successful endeavor. We plan to present these bags to Benchmark Services, which administers the foster care program, at their Christmas party in December. A duffel bag will then be given to each child who enters the foster care program.

It is estimated that each bag will cost \$15-20 filled. We plan to fill the bags with a blanket, stuffed animal, personal hygiene products, and a journal with pen or coloring book and crayons.
