Bill of Particulars by Ed Wilson -

We owe a big Bill. Matter of fact, it's a Bill that probably never will be paid. The Bill we owe is Bill Harlan, who has completed five years as president of the fellowship. And particulars? There are plenty. Far too many to list every single one here. It's not that I agree with everything Bill has said or done as fellowship president. I don't. But I will not let any disagreement I may have with him shade my evaluation of Bill as president of the fellowship. In short, he has done a wonderful job leading our fellowship through a time of transition and growth—growth largely attributable to his progressive leadership.

Throughout his tenure in office, Bill dealt with so many, many particulars. Where shall I begin? Well, let me begin with Bill and Ellen finding the fellowship. When they walked into the little house-become-church on Double Churches Road, it was a lucky day for our fellowship. They became part of us. Very soon, they became active in our UU congregation--in a very positive way. A retired newspaper journalist and later a corporation spokesman, Bill helped organize and implement the move to our present building. A professional musician, a singer and music teacher, now retired, Ellen has shared her marvelous talents with the fellowship, mainly as choir director. I hope you are beginning to see why I say the arrival and involvement of Bill and Ellen is one of the best things that has ever happened to UU Fellowship of Columbus.

Under Bill's presidential leadership, a partial list of particulars might well include: Kept us solvent, secured and monitored building repair and maintenance; found and employed pianists (mostly from the Schwob School of Music at CSU); produced free Sunday afternoon concerts by student musicians; refined our Sunday services (Haven't we enjoyed Bill and Ellen in their time-to-time role as service leaders! Both do it so smoothly!); looked after our building and property, to the extent of opening and closing the fellowship hall (as a sexton would do, if we had one); kept track of members and visited the sick (as a pastor might do, if we had one); even found time to be a member of the choir (the UU Singers); set up countless board and committee meetings (and often chaired the meetings); resolved controversial issues that arose in the board and the congregation (as a pastor might do, if we had one); took a genuine interest in the multitude of details of fellowship life.

At the end of 2019, when he gave his last Sunday morning talk as Fellowship President, he said he would continue to serve the fellowship as a volunteer by looking after programs. Another particular by Bill! No way can we pay our Bill of Particulars. His service is worth much more than we can pay. But we can and will say a heartfelt thank you. And knowing Bill, I think he'll say that's enough. **So, here's to our great Bill of Particulars:** *Thank you, Bill!*

Dr. Ben Pike Passes Away_

Dr. Ben Pike, one of the founding members of our UU fellowship, passed away 1/14/2020. He was 81.

After graduation from the University of Georgia, Ben's first career was as a pharmacist but after two years he went to the University of Tennessee medical school becoming a gastroenterologist and serving in the Air Force for 10 years. In 1975 he came to Columbus and went into practice at St. Francis Hospital until his retirement. His medical office was where UUs gathered before they had a building to call home. Ben was instrumental in finding and financing the first UU Fellowship house on Double Churches Rd.

Over the years, he made many trips to two countries he loved, Ireland and Mexico, where he offered his medical services. He was a licensed pilot and as an athlete he was a passionate biker. At our UU he was a member of the discussion group, where his extensive knowledge of history and ability to make everyone laugh with his humorous anecdotes were much appreciated. We will miss him and remember the contribution he made to our Fellowship.

He is survived by his wife, Linda, and three adult children.
